Favorite Recipes

White Texas Sheet Cake

Boil 1 cup of water and 1 cup of butter. Remove from stove and add:

2 cups flour 2 eggs beaten
2 cups sugar ½ cup sour cream
1 tsp salt 2 tsp almond extract

1 tsp baking soda

Beat until smooth and put into a 15/10/1 inch pan. Bake at 375 degrees for 20-22 minutes.

Frosting

Boil ½ cup butter and ¼ cup milk then remove from heat.

Add: 3-4 ½ cups powdered sugar

1 TBsp almond extract

1 cup chopped nuts

Pour this over warm cake and chill for best taste and texture!


Ranch Mushrooms

- 1 Large blue tub of fresh mushrooms (washed)
- 1 stick of butter
- 1 package Hidden Valley Dry Dressing mix (original)

First you rinse off the mushrooms and put them in a crockpot. Then you melt the butter and add the Ranch dressing packet to the butter. Mix this together and pour over the mushrooms. Turn crockpot on low and cook mushrooms for 3-4 hours or cook on high for an hour.

Note: for every big container of mushrooms you use (I often use 2 big containers because they shrink down so much) you put in one stick of butter and one original Ranch salad dressing packet mix.
